A talk by **Jonathan Aitkin**, who was imprisoned for perjury in 1999. He is now a campaigner for prison reform and Chaplain at Pentonville. A war correspondent in Vietnam & Biafra during his youth, he also wrote a biography of Richard Nixon.

Anthony Riches is author of a series of novels set in the time of Ancient Rome. These are stories of army camaraderie that put the reader right in the heart of the scene, experiencing the blood and gore whilst alimpsing the tactics used in battle.

After around 200 bank robberies and most of his adult life spent in prison, Noel Smith is now Commissioning Editor of Inside Time and author of the bestseller, A Few Kind Words and a Loaded Gun. For Penned Up, he will talk us through his favourite 'true crime' books.

Sarah Hilary is a best selling crime / thriller writer. She will talk aboout her books and writing, and another story close to her heart, that of her grandparents, who were held in a Japanese prisoner of war camp during WWII.

In bands since his teens. Scott Lavene scratched out a living as a musician, playing original ballads of madness, oddness, and love. For the festival, he will play a few of these and perform (with his keyboard and sharp humour) a musical account of his unlikely intro into fatherhood. After serving a short sentence for perjury, **Vicky Pryce** wrote Prisonomics, detailing both her personal experience of prison and how the prison system fails women. She uses her professional understanding to look at jail from an economist's perspective.

One of the guys at Alberto Crisci's last Penned Up talk now has a job with him! Alberto is the chef who came up with the idea of a high-end restaurant in a prison staffed by prisoners. How did he achieve his vision? And how could you get employed by The Clink?

Writer and broadcaster lan Marchant writes about unusual subjects, from pubs to trains to night work. In A Hero for High Times he charts a hidden history of Britain's counter culture through the stories of Bob Rowberry, who claims to be the first to have sold acid to R.D. Laing and who had an early run-in with Saddam Hussain.
